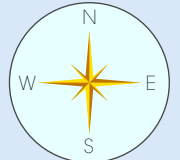
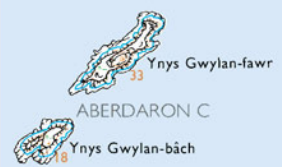


Approximate distance: 7 miles

**1. Aberdaron town**

Converge as the pilgrims did on this delightful seaside town with its old pubs such as Y Gegin Fawr which dates from the 14th century

**4. Porth Meudwy**

This is pretty little cove is an important base for local fishermen.

There's also a harbour that supplies the Bardsey community and from where today's visitors embark.

**2. St. Hywyn's church**

This striking church was founded in the 6th century. The controversial poet RS Thomas was the parish priest here.

**5. Porth y Pistyll**

A little harbour was built here for exporting the local stone.

The workers had to use ropes and ladders to get down to the harbour.

**3. Cwrt**

This area gets its name from the medieval court and exchequer that once stood on this estate and managed and financed the abbey on Bardsey.

**6. Pen y Cil**

This area is an SSSI because of the chough colony found here.

It is also one of the best places to see Bardsey Island from.

It's name means Island in the flood or tides.



7. Mynydd Mawr

Mynydd Mawr offers stunning views in all directions.

During WW2 there was an important lookout station here, staffed by hundreds of military personnel.
