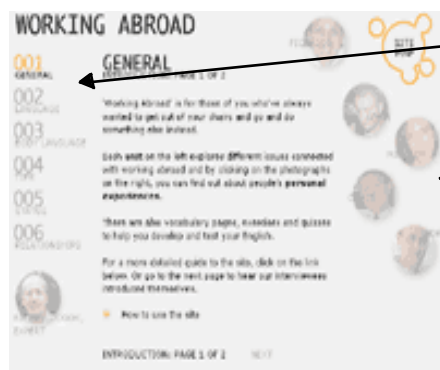
How to use this site (2 pages)

Overview

This an English language teaching site for upper immediate students. It is about the cross cultural issues involved in working in different cultures. The site is based upon a six part radio series (called 'Working Abroad') which features interviews with experts and seven people who are currently working in a culture that is not their own.

Structure

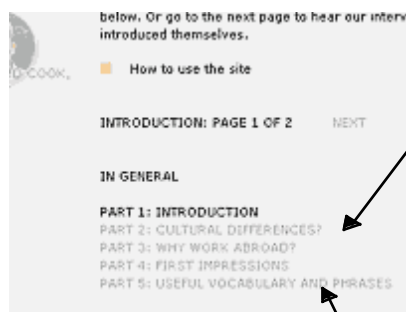
The website site is split into two parts which form the major navigation elements of the site.



On the left there are links to six units of content based around the six radio programmes and the series expert. Included in this area are links to the actual radio programmes.

On the right there are links to five units featuring the experiences of people who are working abroad. You can find out where they are from and what working abroad is really like here.

Each of these separate 13 units has its own internal navigation. This is found at the bottom of each page. It's a list of links to the various areas of content within the unit.



The site is designed to enable you to freely navigate your own way throughout the site. There is no 'one way' through the site, although within each unit (e.g. '001' or 'Federico') it is probably best to go page by page as listed in the bottom navigation.

Use the sitemap (top right corner of the site) to access a list of all the content within the site and a set of extra support material – links to all six radio programmes, a pdf of all the site content and a pdf of all of the vocabulary.

Technical requirements for the site

Audio

Most of the audio on this site is provided as streaming audio using Realplayer. The radio programmes are provided in two versions; streaming via Realplayer and as an MP3 download. Details of both of these formats are given below.

- **Streaming**
Streaming files play while you are online. They cannot be listened to when you are not connected to the internet. To stream the files you will need the free real-player software on your computer. To play the streamed file:-
 - Click on the streaming link. If you have real player correctly installed on your computer the programme will begin to play automatically.
- **Downloading**
Downloadable audio files are in mp3 format. This format can be played by a range of software such as Windows Media Player (Windows) or Quick Time Player (Macintosh). The audio file is saved on your computer and you can listen to the programme when you are not connected to the internet.

Please note - file sizes for downloadable programmes may be very large and can take a long time to download depending on your connection speed. To download the audio file:-

- Right click on the download link (control + click for mac users)
- Select 'Save target as' or 'Save link as'
- Select location where you wish to save
- Click save
